Re: Your letter dated December 11, 2015 to my attention

Mr. Minister

Thank you for your letter dated December 11, 2015, in answer to my letter dated March 30, 2015 addressed to your predecessor, the Honourable Steven Blaney with regard to my request for an inquiry under section 24.1 of the RCMP ACT.

In light of your answer, it is clear that you have never personally acknowledged the content of the information related to my request; including the Analysis of RCMP Derek Flanagan's death. If you had, you surely wouldn't have signed the letter presented to you, to my attention.

Let me be clear Mr. Minister. Number one, by advising me to address myself to the Attorney General of Quebec isn't only illegal, but mixing two very different things. The fact that the Attorney General of Quebec has absolutely no jurisdiction over the RCMP disqualifies such recommendation from your part. Though, I may appreciate your intention, it has nothing to do with my request for an inquiry, under Section 24.1 of the RCMP ACT.

Moreover, the P.C.C. being under your aegis and of federal jurisdiction is also under your authority and responsibility, as Minister of Public Safety. In fact, since, in your letter you stated that my case has been handled properly, in all due respect, I would suggest you to reconsider your facts. If it may help; you will find enclosed, ex-PCC Chairman Richard Goss comments about this; which is among the evidence ignored or turned down by the court. Moreover, if you wish, you may also see what was said through the media, as for instance the CTV-W5 documentary.

If, as you stated that you are satisfied the PCC investigation on Operation Deception was handled properly, I may only kindly invite you to revise your facts. In fact, a brief look at ex-PCC Chairman Richard Goss makes ample proof of that and shows how the McEwen's report was buried, cause too critical of the RCMP. For your information,

you'll further find in attach something to enlighten you on what really occurred at the PCC. If after this, you wish telling me that all was well; I am inviting you to do so.

Number two, under the law, as Public Safety Minister, it is your mandated duty to investigate and intervene under Section 24 (1) of the RCMP Act; when there is clear evidence of wrongdoings from the part of any of the institutions and employees under your aegis and supervision. Among others, this includes the RCMP and the PCC. This being said, I am especially sending to your attention a copy (re; Analysis of RCMP Flanagan's death), hoping that you will this time around take the time acknowledging its content, rather than taking the words of people, who continue trying to hide the truth.

Considering that lying to have a Canadian citizen sentenced to death and about the true circumstances surrounding the death of a RCMP officer, as well as the P.C.C. cover up of Paul McEwen's report of March 6, 1991 are matters of public order, as such, it directly falls under your responsibility and civic duty to intervene.

It may also be said that as Minister of Public Safety, you also do have a legal duty to act, since not doing so would amount to disobeying status under Section 126 of the criminal code.

126. (1) Every one who, without lawful excuse, contravenes an Act of Parliament by wilfully doing anything that it forbids or by wilfully omitting to do anything that it requires to be done...

Since the court, wilfully or not, closed their eyes and chose ignoring all the evidence related to RCMP Flanagan's death and that my civil action was dismissed because of prescription and not heard by the Supreme Court, I'll keep from making any comment on this. However, I've learned long time ago that it is not because someone (including judges) says something is true and people believe something is true that it makes it the truth. Contrary to lies, the truth, on the other end, never dies.

It is therefore in all due respect that am asking you to use your discretionary power under Section 24.1 of the RCMP Act for the institution of an impartial inquiry with regard to the P.C.C. handling of my case, as well as into the death of a RCMP Derek Flanagan.

With the arrival of a new government in Ottawa, I am ready to accept that you were not aware of certain facts and possibly wrongly advised by staff members unwilling to admit the truth, but willing to defend the un-defendable. And for that reason, I am taking the time sending you the information attached herein.

A chance is given to you here to reconsider your position and righting a wrong from you own volition, rather than finding yourself in a position, where you'll be forced to explain the inertia of your ministry to act.

If after having personally taken time to acknowledge the content of the enclosed information, you were still willing to maintain your position, as expressed through your letter dated Dec 11, 2015, I am inviting you to do so. In fact, it would be most

appreciated, you clearly stating to me that after personally acknowledging the content of the Analysis of Flanagan's death that you haven't found anything supporting the fact that RCMP members have lied about the death RCMP Derek Flanagan's death. Of course, a refusal to respond should be and will be interpreted as an admission from your part to the veracity of my allegations with regard of RCMP Flanagan's death.

We are talking about the death of a RCMP officer and Force members lying about it. You should therefore treat this matter very carefully, rather than risking coming to the wrong conclusions. The Canadian public who financed RCMP Operation Deception and my death sentence in Thailand is entitled to the truth and I do hope you'll act accordingly.

Just as I am, you are fully conscious of all the implications and consequences related to covering up the truth and lying about the death of a police officer and, as such, I trust the Liberal Government do not wish being associated to that.

On a last note, if I were in your position, I would make sure the RCMP refrain from trying to do me harms.
