In the absence of a reply from your part to my letter dated February 4, 2019, as well as my other letter dated February 5, 2019, which you'll find enclosed, I am taking a moment to write you.

This being said, it brings me to reiterate my demand to you to institute a public hearing into RCMP's conduct, under Section 24.1 of the RCMP Act. As detailed in my previous letters to your attention, RCMP members have lied about the circumstances surrounding RCMP Derek Flanagan's death. Clear evidence of this was sent to you in the past, in a document titled Analysis of RCMP Derek Flanagan's death.

Although, the Hon. Justice Minister David Lametti took time answering my letter to his attention right away with regard of initiating a public inquiry into the circumstances surrounding RCMP Derek Flanagan's death, his empty reply did not come as a surprise. As it occurred with my demands in the past to previous justice ministers, I was told that such inquiry remained the responsibility of the Public Safety Minister.

Unfortunately, and as I said he would, the minister of justice has chosen to have someone else to reply to my letter on his behalf. You'll find enclosed the said reply to my attention, dated February 28, 2019.

Considering that the promise for more transparency and accountability was part of your electoral platform, an opportunity is given to you to show the Canadian public that such promise really means something, M. Minister. As such, I am inviting you to act in that sense. Until a public inquiry is instituted to investigate why RCMP members have lied about the death of RCMP Cpl. Derek Flanagan, this story won't go away. A very detailed file has even been set in that regard to save time to everyone.

In light of the information found in the content of the analysis of RCMP Flanagan's death, the fact that no one at Public Safety in Ottawa has dared to deny the allegations found in it speaks for itself. To refuse to address such serious matter will only lead Canadian taxpayers to believe that you and your office are trying to cover the truth.

With my upcoming book and the world premiere of the movie based on the story of my treatment at the hands of the RCMP this September in Toronto, inevitably, it will all resurface through the media, one way or another.

It takes a lot of will to dredge the past, even more so when it comes down to uncovering the truth in a case as politically sensitive as this one, which no one in Ottawa has so far cared to do by fear of obfuscating the Mounties and tarnishing their image.

An opportunity is offered to you to show Canadian taxpayers how much you and your office do indeed care about the truth and transparency. However, please, keep in mind that without the pleasure of a reply from your part, M. Minister, it will only enhance the perception among media members and the Canadian public that you are trying to cover up the truth at your turn, as all your predecessors did.

After having been subjected to the death in Thailand as a result of RCMP's lies, I'll never be apologetic for telling the truth and standing for it, M. Minister, doesn't matter what. The fact that you have remained silent and refused to act, thus far, is at the image of the malaise this story has generated among Canadian government officials over the years.

Life has taught me that there is much more merit at standing for the truth than to contribute at covering it up. If you believe that my allegations are unfounded, I am challenging you or anyone, M. Minister, to prove me wrong and to state in clearly on paper.

Looking forward to hear from you, M Minister, and to get a reply to this letter, and the previous ones, within reasonable delay. I remain...
